Workshop

A workshop will incorporate a substantial component of interaction between presenter and audience and will be an opportunity for participants to actively develop their skills and knowledge, leading to new insights.

Swapshop

In this session a particular and specific aspect of practice will be highlighted as the presenter acts as a facilitator to enable participants to share their materials and/or ideas.

Panel

Three or four delegates with knowledge and expertise in a particular area can present a panel session in which discussion and Q&A between the participants and panelists occurs.

NEW IN 2009 - Information Session

Those representing organisations or businesses with a close relationship to ELICOS may submit a proposal to present an 'information session' as part of their sponsorship/exhibitor package. The content of this session may be based on a product or service but it will provide delegates with information about new developments and/or practical information or skills. Information sessions will comprise an additional separate stream within the program.
